



# Scrapbuster Pretty Prism Quilt

### Yardage

Scraps - WOF - minimum 2-1/2+ yds total

5/8 yd - border

1/2 yd - binding

2-3/4 yd - backing

50" X 65" batting or similar

### Supplies

Rotary Cutter

Cutting Mat

8-1/2" x 24-1/2" ruler or similar

Template plastic (optional)

Best Press or spray starch (optional)

Scissors

Pins

Thread

NOTE: WOF = width of fabric based on 44"/45"

HST = half square triangles

RST = right sides together



### Cutting

Scraps - WOF

(60) 1-1/2" strips x WOF

**NOTE:** you will have a few pieces left over - this allows for wider variation and design choices.

Border

(5) 3-1/2" strips x WOF - border

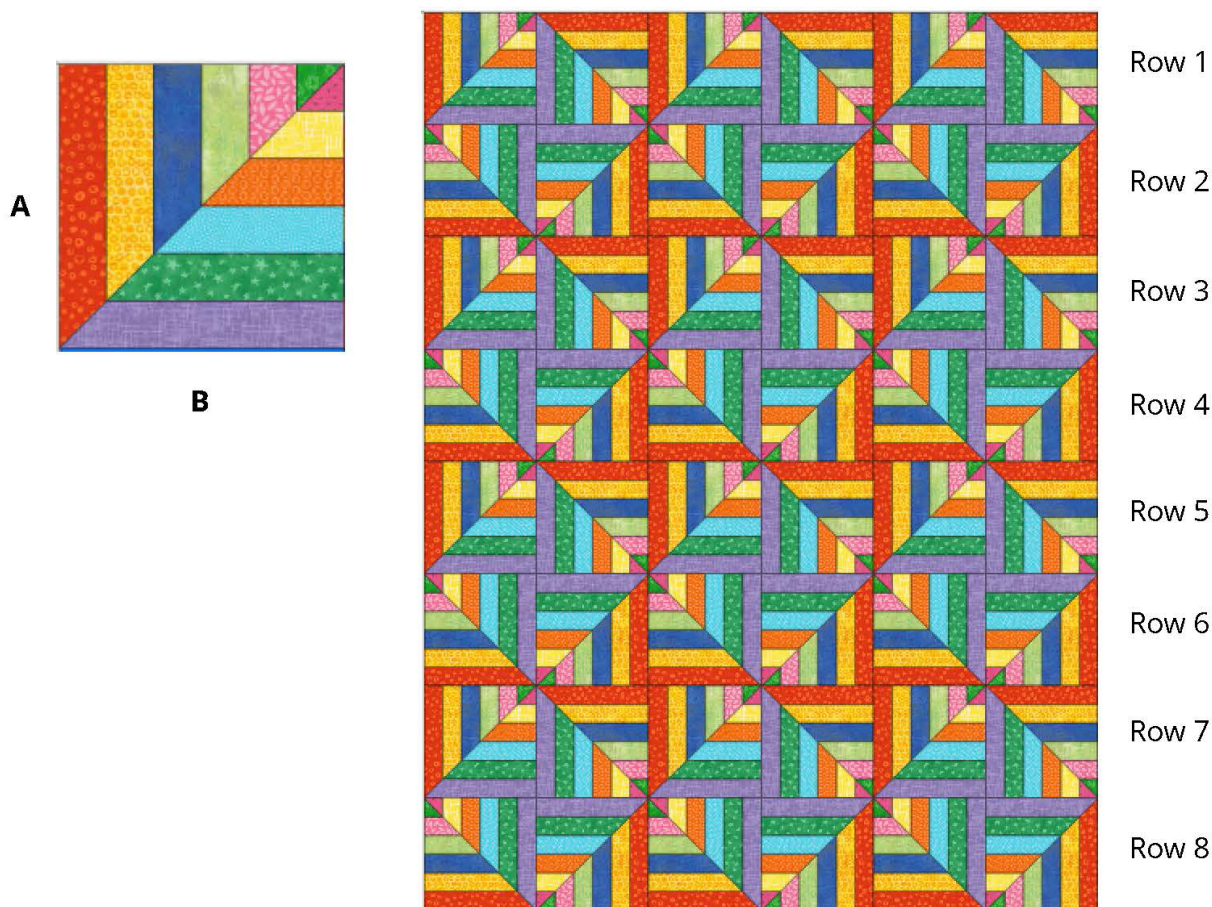
Binding

(5) 2-1/2" strips x WOF - binding

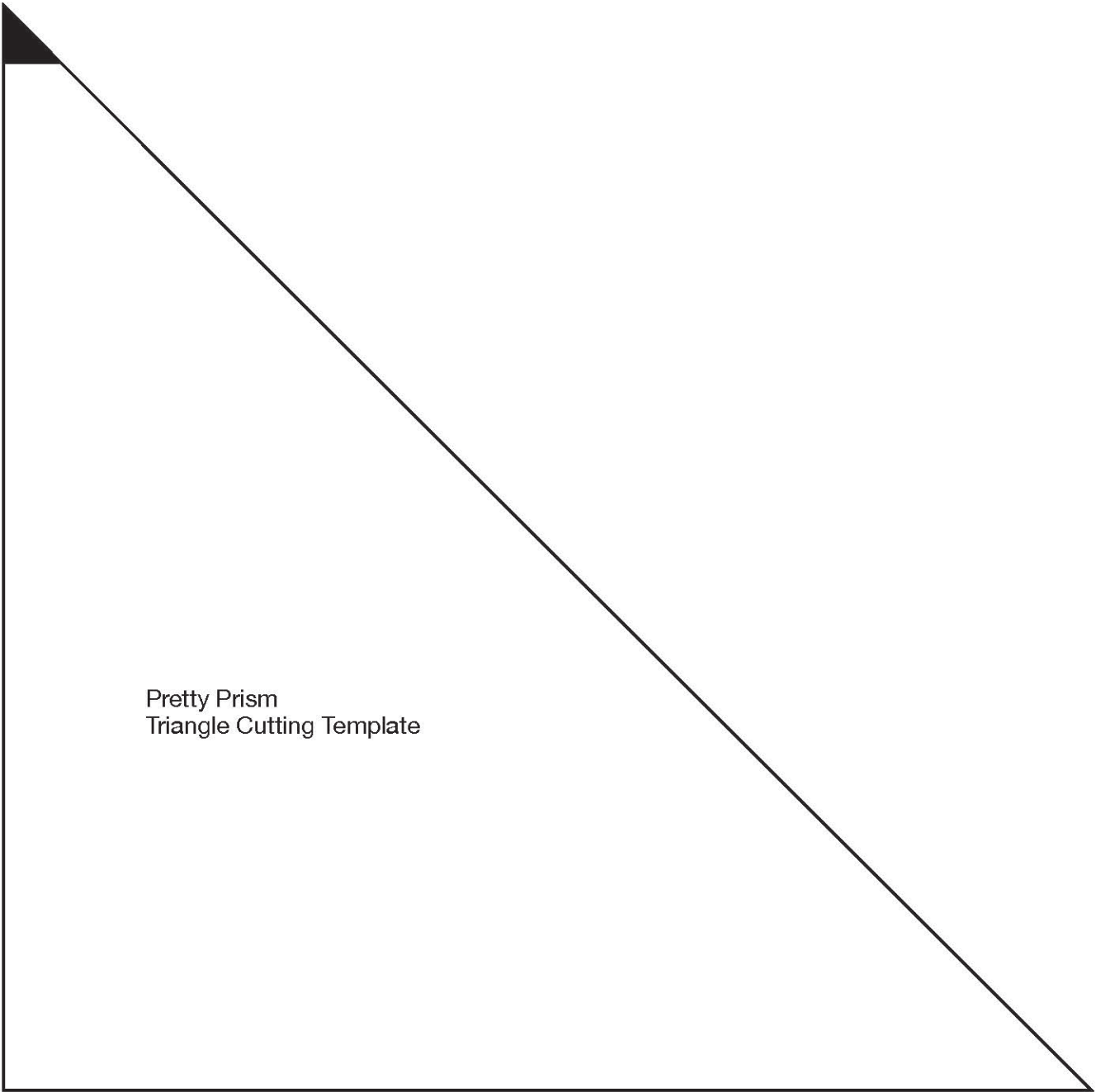
### Construction

1. Join strips into pairs using a 1/4" seam. Press seams to one side. Make **(30) strips sets**

2. Select (3) pairs created in Step 1. Arrange pairs and join to make a SIX fabric strip set.  
Note - I joined my strips so that all seams were going in one direction. I found it easier to press pairs, then press the finished 6 strip set. Continue until you have created **(10) SIX fabric strip sets**.
3. Next, select (2) six fabric strip sets. Place these strip sets RST. Using the template (found with this pattern) to mark or cut triangles along the strip set. Sort pieces into A's and B's. Continue this cutting process until all (10) six fabric strips are cut into triangles. See video for details. This quilt uses **(48) A triangles** and **(48) B triangles**. NOTE: You will have extra units so you can make design choices.
4. Using the diagram/photo arrange the A and B triangles into the desired pattern. (Note: the colors used only simulate the coloration. Each quilt is unique)



5. Working one row at a time - Join A to B, pressing seams in **odd number rows to the right** and **even numbered rows to the left**. This will insure opposing seams at intersections as you join rows. You will make (6) blocks per row, for a total of 48 blocks.
