

Block Arrangement: 156 Blocks (12 x 13)


Fabric & Cutting Requirements

Blocks Arrangement	
2 ½" wide strips (Shown in Boundless Flower Shoppe)	40
Background and Border	3 ½ yards
Backing	4 ½ yards
Binding	% yard cut into eight 2 ½" wide strips
Helpful tools	Strip Tube Ruler™ or Strip Tube Junior™ by Cozy Quilt Designs

Block Assembly




- 1. Collect 40— 2 1/2" strips of various prints.
- 2. From your background fabric, cut 20 4 1/2" strips from width of fabric.
- 3. Sew together 2 print strips using a 1/4" seam allowance. Press in one direction. Your strip set should measure 4 1/2" wide. Make 20 strip sets.






5. Place the 5 1/2" measurement line* of your ruler on the bottom stitching line and cut a 5 1/2" triangle that opens to a 5 1/2" square.




* You can use a square-up ruler for this. A 6" or 6 1/2" square is just right. Turn the ruler so the 0 point is on the top. Find your measurement on the left and the matching measurement on the right. Mark with masking tape or Omnigrid Glow-Line tape. Use this line as your placement guide.



- 6. Press the middle in the same direction as the strip seam. Trim off any dog ears.
- 7. Repeat with the 5 1/2" measurement on the top stitching line. Make fresh cuts, but conserve fabric. Then continue down the strip set until you have 8 squares with two different fabric configurations.

Keep matching sets of two together.

8. Cut all 20 tubes in this manner. Collect 71 matching sets of two and 14 individual blocks without a mate.



Row Assembly

1. Pull a matching set of two blocks. Arrange them as pictured. The prints should make a small triangle and nesting "V". Sew together. Repeat with all sets of two.



2. Sew 6 sets of 2 into a row The background triangles should be touching. Repeat to create 6 rows, each with 6 pairs. You now have 6 of Row B. Press the middle seams to the right.




3. Sew 5 sets of 2 into a row, putting an individual block on each end of the row. Repeat to create 7 rows. You now have 7 of Row A. Press the middle seams to the left.




- 4. Arrange your rows as pictured, starting with Row A, then alternating with Row B. Sew your rows together to make the quilt top. Press your long seams in one direction.
- 5. From your Border fabric, cut 8— 3 1/2" strips. Attach to quilt and press the seams out.
- 6. Layer, Quilt, Bind, and Enjoy!

Quilt Layout




Quilting Diagrams



Turn In Early: Picking out a design is one thing. Deciding how to quilt it efficiently is another thing altogether. For this quilt, using the walking foot to quilt straight lines is an easy option. Quilting several blocks at a time makes the easy option even more efficient. So no matter what quilt you are working on, always be thinking how you can make the process more efficient.

Up All Night: Using the walking foot and free-motion foot to quilt your quilt is a fun way to make the most of the tools at hand. After quilting all the straight lines, you can use the free-motion quilting foot to quilt flower-like curves in the background. This not only helps show off the flower theme of the fabric, it also means you can quickly finish the quilt. Talk about a win/win!
